Gary Burton, Chairman Howell Town Planning Commission: Results on Rezoning Public Hearing

Chairman Burton met with the Town Council to report on the results of the public hearing they held regarding rezoning some property from A20 to RR-1. The Planning Commission recommends the Town Council approve this.

Scheduling Community Center

Town Clerk H. Leon, who schedules the community center, reported that he received a text from one of the renters stating that the building was not open when they come to use it.

In the past a loaner key was given to the renter, but the key was not returned. Council Member Josh Anderson suggested using a lock box to put the key in. The renter would be given a code to open the box and get the key. When they leave, they can put the key back in the lock box. A new code would be set for the next renter. Mayor Hawkes asked Council Member Anderson to investigate getting a lock box.

Conflict of Interest and Ethics Pledge forms

Town Clerk H. Leon Kotter reported that the conflict-of-interest forms must be turned in by each elected and appointed town officer by January 31st each year and posted on the town's website. They must remain on the website until the officer is no longer in office.

The ethics pledge form is voluntary but encouraged to fill out.
